Commander's Comments

Miscellaneous attempts on domestic Army bases, The World Trade Center, Khobar Towers, Oklahoma City and the War on Terrorism all generate images of craters, destroyed and smoldering buildings, and a loss of life. These and other past events have left a world changed forever, especially in regards to security of personnel and missions. The Air Force has developed a new approach, referred to as Integrated Base Defense, allowing for more thorough measures to secure installations. The changes and attitudes towards security are critical to securing the people, mission and resources of the 181st Intelligence Wing.

IBD is a layered approach looking outside to inside the installation. IBD is the primary responsibility of Security Forces; however, the IBD approach recognizes each airman's role in helping secure the installation. Airmen outside the base should be cautious of people asking questions about what is done at our installation. Personnel should remember opera-

tional security is a full-time practice and mindset. Airmen should report all suspicious activity they encounter outside the installation that might affect the mission of our Wing.

Inside an installation, all airmen can aid with IBD by noticing unusual occurrences or behaviors. For example, a backpack leaning against a wall or door, with no one around, warrants sounding the alarm and contacting security forces immediately. An unknown person milling around buildings may deserve a call to the Base Defense Operations Center or at least being challenged. When contacting BDOC, the airman should provide as much information as possible.

How does IBD affect the 181st IW and our security culture? New security initiatives will begin in the near future to comply with the IBD regulations and measures, including random vehicle checks, hand carried item checks (for those members working in a sensitive compartmented information facility), all on duty SF members are armed, newer and more advanced camera systems are being installed providing a force multiplier for perimeter security, all commercial vehicles are searched prior to entrance and patrols are being conducted around the base. Efforts are also being made to redesign the main entrance for more efficient traffic flow and a new installation entry control point.

You may be asking what this has to do with you. While it is true security forces is responsible to protect each person, building, mission, as well as ensure public safety, our mission cannot be completed successfully without the help of each airman. Each airman can help in a multitude of ways such as: reporting suspicious activity or persons, practicing good communications security and operational security (especially while out in public) and remain flexible to the security changes, as they are for your safety and protection.

An excellent IBD plan will help ensure the Wing's mission is not interrupted by protecting people, mission and property. Do what you can; after all, you have stake in the success of the mission.

CHIEF'S COMMENTS

What Do I Do Now?

In my last article, entitled "Why Am I Here?" we considered the benefits of membership in the Air National Guard and discussed some of the satisfactions a person could receive being a member of our Profession of Arms. My 8 simple rules are worth a look if you haven't seen them (May/Jun 2010 issue). With the "Why am I here?" out of the way, let's take a look at the next question, "What do I do now?"

Air Force Instruction 36-2618, The Enlisted Force Structure, states airmen, to include junior enlisted, noncommissioned officers, and senior noncommissioned officers (SNCOs), will maintain the highest level of personal readiness to meet mission requirements by being technically, physically, mentally, and spiritually ready to accomplish the mission.

That's all? Wow! No pressure there. As my NCO Academy instructor, Technical Sergeant Felch (now CMSgt Felch) used to say "Break it down!"

Technical: Attain and maintain the skill level for your rank. Thoroughly invest yourself in your Career Field Education and Training Plan. Section B gives the overall duties and responsibilities of your Air Force Specialty Code. Know your role and how it supports the mission! Expand your professional development and technical expertise by earning a Community College of the Air Force degree. Complete your Professional Military Education ahead of schedule to be ready for any advancement opportunities.

Physical: Meet Air Force standards. Set positive examples for peers and subordinates. Promote, support, and participate in unit physical training activities. Locally, our leadership has provided us with an invaluable resource for meeting standards, the Fitness Experts, utilize them to establish and meet your goals.

Mental: Quality of life, finances, harassment, discrimination, stress, marital problems, and substance abuse are all issues that affect and detract from personal readiness. As Wingmen, it is our responsibility to be counted upon, in all situations, both on and off-duty. But there are some things we just are not trained to handle, when an issue is beyond our ability to deal with its time to hand it over to the experts. If you, or a fellow airman, need assistance, there is an abundance of resources readily accessible. One such resource is close at hand, Kim Salsman, Wing Director Psychological Health, is available right here on base to provide counseling and referral services when needed.

Spiritual: As defined by the Air Force, spiritual readiness is the development of those personal qualities needed to help a person through times of stress, hardship, and tragedy, and may or may not include religious activities. I have developed mine (actually, I give the credit to my parents and grandparents) and those qualities have been tested through stress (work and home), hardship (deployments), and tragedy (death). I hope you have your "personal qualities." Know that as military members we have the Chaplain Services and other support agencies available to assist us during times of spiritual need.

What Do I Do Now? The answer is simple - IN OMNIA PARATUS!

Racers participate in PATRIOT 2012

When a simulated earthquake measuring 5.0 on the Richter scale struck Wisconsin last Monday, followed the next day by another rumble measuring 6.0, 1100 personnel from 24 states responded to the disaster. The 181st Intelligence Wing of Terre Haute, Ind., provided two of those responders--the 19th Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear and high-yield Explosive Enhanced Response Force Package and the Fatality and Services Recovery Response Team.

The simulated earthquakes closed roads and bridges and collapsed buildings as part of the exercise known as PATRIOT 2012. Along with the 181st IW, the exercise involved government agencies ranging from the FBI to the Department of Health and Human Services and the Civilian Air Patrol.

PATRIOT 2012 provided interagency training on domestic operations and promoted the integration of primary disaster response forces and secondary disaster response forces in a realistic hands-on scenario.

"This exercise presented a great training opportunity for the 19th CERFP," said Lt. Col. Robert Abbinett Jr., the Medical Element officer-in-charge. "PATRIOT 2012 allowed our members to accomplish mission-essential training for CERFP that was not available locally."

The mission of the 19th CERFP was to provide support to disaster casualties through medical care ranging from cuts and bruises to deep lacerations and unconscious patients.

"This was realistic training," Abbinett said. "It sharpened our skills and helped to refine our goal of responding to a local disaster within three hours and being able to process 300 people an hour."

FSRTs were established to augment the CERFP's casualty and extraction teams, and the 181st IW deployed 11 FSRT members to participate in the simulated earthquake recovery.

During PATRIOT 2012, these members were realistically trained on body recovery by enduring the sights and smells of decayed animal carcasses as they searched through wreckage clouded by billowing smoke.

"This was very realistic training," said Captain Randi Brown, the FSRT officer-in-charge. "The PATRIOT 2012 exercise was the first time the Fatality Search and Recovery Team has maintain equipment during participated in a disaster scenario. I think we did an outstanding job."

Agencies participating in PATRIOT 2012 provided unit-specific objectives and goals.

"Thirty-seven members deployed here via a C-5," said Colonel Patti Mook, Commander Master John Day of the 181st Medical Group. "The entire process validated our ability to respond to disasters anywhere in the United States."

The Indiana Air National Guard's 181st Intelligence Wing, Terre Haute, Ind., recently welcomed home three members from a deployment to Multi-National Base Tarin Kowt, Afghanistan.

Lt. Col. Charles Iracondo, Master Sgt. Damon Girton and Airman 1st Class Austin Rowlands, members of the 181st Intelligence Wing's 113th Air Support Operation Squadron, returned from a rotation in the Australian lead province of Uruzgan, Afghanistan. Uruzgan is located in the south-central part of Afghanistan and is currently in transition back to Afghan control.

The three airmen serve in the Tactical Air Control Party career field and during their unique deployment they worked alongside coalition partners in handing control of the province back to the local government and people.

The coalition of U.S., Australian, Slovakian and Singaporean troops are continuing to train and educate Afghan forces to enable progression towards security and self-governance. TACP members were instrumental in providing terminal control of close air support and Intelligence Surveillance Reconnaissance assets employed across the province in support of on-going operations.

During this deployment, 181st IW TACPs assigned to the 113th ASOS were aligned with an Indiana Army National Guard Infantry Brigade Combat Team for the first time. This home-grown relationship between the 113th ASOS and the 76st IBCT was taken to a new level when an Indiana IBCT ground commander approved actions conducted by an Indiana Joint Terminal Attack Controller in support of combat operations, another first for the Indiana Air National Guard.

Members of the 113th ASOS and the 76st IBCT look forward to a continued relationship that puts the outstanding work of our Indiana National Guard front and center.

Mass casualty disaster simulation

It was a scene of carnage and chaos as emergency responders reacted to a mass casualty exercise. "Casualties" littered the ground. Screams, emergency sirens, and cries of pain resonated in the air. Seem horrifying? It's supposed to.

The 181st Intelligence Wing Medical Group recently participated in a mass casualty exercise at the Terre Haute International Airport - Hulman Field, Ind. The exercise purpose was to simulate an aircraft crash with multiple casualties.

The exercise included approximately 80 participants, including members of the 181st IW, students in Indiana State University nursing program, students from Ivy Tech Community College paramedic program, participants from Rural Health Innovation Collaborative Simulation Center, Indiana Homeland Security's Task Force 7 Mass Casualty Unit, and the Terre Haute International Airport.

The event marks the first time multiple Terre Haute medical and disaster response organizations have participated in a mass casualty exercise.

The exercise evaluated nursing students on triage and in-

troduced them to disaster community involvement. The 181st IW Medical Group provided the instructors for the nursing students.

1st Lt. Nicole S. Hall, an instructor for the drill, and a clinical instructor for the Community Health Course at ISU, said the mock exercise helped military medics and nurses go through casualty procedures.

"This exercise helps the medics determine who they have to deal with first and get them used to the anxiety and how they deal with it, so when a real world situation comes they will have a little bit more knowledge to draw on," said Lieutenant Hall.
